

VPM Chairman's Message



The recent Gaza invasion is yet one more tragic story in a long, sad tragedy that has befallen a people whose story has been denied and distorted. The people of Gaza have become destitute in their homeland, more so the women and children. The dehumanization of the Palestinians of

Gaza has been described as a crisis of human dignity. In the aftermath of the Gaza massacre, fifty NGOs formed the Coalition of Malaysian NGO's against the Persecution of Palestinians which was later renamed Viva Palestina Malaysia (VPM).

Since her inception in Jan 2009, VPM has been unrelenting in her pursuit towards advocating justice and self-determination for Palestine. In more tangible forms, VPM has transferred over RM 6 Million worth of funds to finance various medical, educational, micro-financing and women's projects and recently food, clean water and other emergency relief in Gaza.

Our previous two KL-Palestine Film Festivals (KLPFF) were resounding successes. This altruistic film fest screened to the Malaysian public highlights the sufferings and persecution of the Palestinian people under Zionist occupation of their lands. Our film screenings have opened to full house audiences and we have raised significant funding for various projects in Palestine. We are hopeful to raise a similar quantum through KLPFF 2014 to fund much needed ambulances with medical aid and the second phase of the rebuilding of Gaza after the recent invasion.

It would have been impossible to achieve the many milestones in our 'End the Occupation' campaign, towards a free and independent Palestine without the generous support of our individual and corporate donors, well wishers and symphatisers.

My eternal gratitude to the band of VPM die-hards and volunteers who have worked tirelessly and ungrudgingly to showcase the humanitarian crisis in Gaza though the medium of films and documentaries. We dedicate this KLPFF to the brave people of Gaza, whose resolve and spirit remain unbroken in the face of extreme odds. We salute the brave people of Gaza and together we await the promises of the Al-Mighty when He says, "Help from Allah and Victory is at hand" (Al-Quran 61:13).



Nep publika

A World Not Ours Documentary - 93 mins



An intimate, and often humorous, portrait of three generations of exile in the refugee camp of Ein el-Helweh, in southern Lebanon. Based on a wealth of personal recordings family archives, and historical footage, the film is a sensitive, and illuminating study of belonging, friendship, and family in the lives of those for whom dispossession is the norm, and vearning their daily lives.

Filmed over more than 20 years by multiple generations of the same family. A World Not Ours is more than just a family portrait: it is an attempt to record what is being forgotten, and mark what should not be erased from collective memory.

Inch'Allah Drama - 102 mins



Inch'Allah looks at the emotional and psychological tolls that war has on the individual. A Canadian doctor named Chloé (Evelyne Brochu) find herself caught on both sides of the concrete wall that separates the two territories, both literally and figuratively. Chloé is hired to work in a clinic in Palestine and she lands the side job of being the personal nurse to a pregnant young Palestinian woman. As Chloé tends to

the wounds of Palestinians, she sees firsthand the violence and destruction that ravages the land through war.

Anchored by an excellent performance by Evelyne Brochu, through Chloé's strained and war-worn eyes, the audience sees a need to end the violence because it corrupts all.

The Stones Cry Out Documentary - 56mins



Palestine is the oradle of Christianity, but 'the living aspect of Christianity in Palestine is disappearing,' warns Palestinian politician Hanan Ashrawi Christianity was born in Palestine 2.000 years ago. From there it

spread throughout the Middle East and the rest of the world. Yet many are unaware Christians still live in the land. For more than 60 years, the Palestinians, Christians and Muslims have suffered displacement, expulsion, wars, occupation and oppression. The voices of Palestinian Christians have all too often been drowned out in the turmoil of events. This is their story, in their voices, from the Nakba of 1948 until today as they recount the unwavering and sometimes desperate struggle of all Palestinians to resist Israel's occupation and stay on their land.

Omar Drama Thriller - 96mins





Nominated for best foreign language film at the Academy Awards 2014

Omar tells the story of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict from the Palestinian point of view in a way that no movie has done before. A

voung Palestinian freedom fighter agrees to work as an informant after he's tricked into an admission of quilt by association in an Israeli soldier's killing.

The central theme is the relationships between people on both sides of the fence, be it family, lovers, friends or schoolmates. The separation wall play a visible role in the plot, a literally high obstacle to be crossed to maintain contact.

This movie contains elements that one looks for in a movie: it has action scenes, dramatic events of betraval and honesty, a pure and naive love story, friendship, funny scenes, and above all, it makes the audience ask questions and think.


The Exhibition

The Speakers



Yasmine Perni moved from her native Italy to the Middle East when she was 13 years old, living in Sudan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Svria. Jordan and Jerusalem. A graduate of the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies, she has worked as a journalist, photographer, television producer

and mother. She speaks Italian, English, Swedish and Arabio.

Perni went into documentary filmmaking inspired by the Christians of Palestine, whose story of perseverance and pride has been largely obscured by the headlines. For this documentary, she conducted extensive research, combed through official Palestinian, Israel and United Nations film archives, and traveled the length and breadth of historic Palestine.

Married and with three children, she recently returned to live in Italy but frequently travels back to the Middle East.







Laila El-Haddad, author of Gaza Mom: Palestine, Politics, Parenting, and Everything In Between and co-author of The Gaza Kitchen: A Palestinian Culinary Journey, is a talented blogger, political analyst, social activist, and parent-of-three from Gaza City. She is also a contributing author to The Goldstone Report: The Legacy of the Landmark Investigation of the Gaza Conflict. and a policy advisor with al-Shabaka, the Palestinian Policy Network.

The Gaza Kitchen is a cookbook which serves as an introduction to daily life in the embattled Gaza Strip: a visit to the intimate everyday spaces which never appear in the news. The recipes present the enticinally herby, peppery. lemony tastes of Gazan home-cooking.

largely unknown to outsiders, while conversations with cooks, farmers, economists and others provide an extraordinary alimpse into daily life for the 1.7 million inhabitants of the isolated enclave. The book brings Gaza and its people to life.
